

# PASTOR'S CORNER

Dear Friends,

Over the years, I've sometimes been called dark and depressing. There is probably some truth in that. Recently, I've been reading writings of Blaise Pascal. Pascal was a 17th century French mathematician, physicist, inventor and Christian philosopher. His writings on the human condition are stark and haunting. He saw the human condition as a one-way road to death. Death is a fact from which all people try to hide; yet it remains a fact. We will all die and we know it; however, we live as if we will never die. He described the human condition this way: 'Imagine a number of men in chains, all under a sentence of death, some of whom are killed each day in the sight of the others. Those remaining see their own fate in that of their fellows and, looking at each other with grief and despair, await their turn.' Yikes; and you thought I was dark.

Pascal said that humans respond to their hopeless condition in three ways: diversion, indifference, and self-deception. Rather than facing death and looking for a cure, we would rather ignore that fact and lie to ourselves.

About these, he writes: 'Being unable to cure death and wretchedness, men have, decided, in order to be happy, not to think about such things. I can quite see that it makes a man happy to be diverted from contemplating his private miseries by making him care about nothing but dancing well.' With TV, movies, sports, the internet, we live to be diverted from the deeper things of life. It is much the same with indifference and self-deception. There was a bumper sticker that said: 'Everyone needs to believe in something...I believe I'll have another beer.' And so, it goes.

Pascal believed that it is only by facing the reality of the human condition that one can begin to seek and hear the promise of faith. His goal was to shake people out of their indifference and remove their diversions to remind them that eternal issues are of greater worth than temporary.

Lent is a time to look at the deep realities of life, sin and death. It is not until we face the bad news of the human condition that we are able to hear and cling to the good news of Good Friday and Easter.

I was thinking about sharing some of these thoughts in my Easter sermon, but decided it might be a bit much before ham and sweet potatoes. I decided I would share it with you instead (You can thank me later). May you know and trust in Jesus Christ and the power of his resurrection.

**Income and Expenses Summary Notes:**

**Income**

The period ending February 28, 2017 has an operating deficit of less than \$1K, which resulted in a positive variance of \$2K compared to February 2016. Congregational Contributions through February 2016 are approximately \$11K less than the total contributions received through February 2016; Building Use/Other Income is virtually even to the amount this time last year. Total Income at February 28, 2017 is \$12K less than February 2016. Congregational Contributions are under budget by \$23K and Total Income is under budget by \$25K as of February 28, 2017. **Note:** Other Income includes periodic gifts made by Meals on Wheels and the St. Paul Preschool; the Thrivent Choice Donation program; paper recycling proceeds; and other miscellaneous unrestricted income. **Note:** the Meals on Wheels program at St. Paul ended December 31, 2016.

**Expenses**

Total expenses were under budget by \$19K as of February 28, 2017; and the total amount is \$14K less than total expenses as of February 28, 2016.

**Note:** Benevolence payments are percentages of contributions. Therefore, when contributions are higher, benevolence payments are higher.



## **SHEEP & GOATS FOCUS**



Lutheran Metropolitan Ministry's Westhaven Youth Shelter and Youth Re-Entry Program have combined to form Next Step. The programs merged in order to provide a continuum of care to better serve vulnerable youth in Cleveland. Next Step will ultimately provide older youth who are without a home or a stable living environment with shelter care and independent living. Plans are underway to also provide transitional housing in the near future. Next Step will ensure that youth who are hurting and forgotten do not fall through the cracks and miss out on services they so desperately need. In addition to meeting the basic needs of housing, food and clothing, these gender-specific services also include counseling, independent-living skills and job placement.

Next Step is currently providing shelter care and supervised, cluster-site, independent living for females in the former Westhaven building located at 3020 W. 104<sup>th</sup>, Cleveland, Ohio. The upstairs of the building has been newly remodeled to provide safe, comfortable housing for young women.

Supervised, cluster-site, independent living for male clients will continue to be provided at 11849 Clifton Blvd., Lakewood, Ohio. Next Step also offers scattered site apartments at various locations throughout the city once a participant demonstrates the skills to live more independently.

LMM is deeply committed to the welfare of people in Cleveland and is listening and responding to their needs—in this case, the needs of our youth.

## REFUGEES: WHAT WOULD JESUS DO - Fifth in a Series



Have you been moved by the articles about refugees in the Middle East? Are you wondering what can be done to assist them? In light of the current political climate, it is getting a bit more difficult. Please keep praying for these people and for guidance in how we can respond to their plight.

N is now 18 years old. He and his family fled Syria in 2014. About one year before they fled Syria, N was in the wrong place at the wrong time and took a bullet to his upper back. He was only about 14 years old at that time. The bullet injured his spinal cord leaving him completely paralyzed in his legs and lower trunk and partially paralyzed in his upper trunk and arms. In addition to leaving Syria because of safety concerns, he also came to Jordan hoping to receive whatever therapy he could find to regain as much use of his limbs as he could, if any was possible.

Now, recall that most refugees register with the UNHCR (United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees) and as such cannot work in Jordan, but received limited assistance from the UNHCR and some aid through the generosity of the Jordanian (or other host country's) government and humanitarian aid groups. Somehow, living as a refugee, N has managed to receive some physical therapy and when I saw him in 2016, he had enough movement in his shoulders, arms and hands to work toward propelling himself in a wheelchair! (When I first saw him in 2014 he had to be pushed in his chair, there was only slight movement and no strength in his arms.) With his tenacity and commitment, I believe he should be able to reach his goal of propelling his own wheelchair.

Refugees from Syria and Iraq are predominately of the majority faith in the region, but you will find refugees that come from a variety of faiths. Some persecuted by opposing sects of Islam, others threatened and forced to leave because of their Christian faith, others just because they do not agree with the extremists, or like N's family, they come out of fear of the dangerous conflict and with hopes of better medical care and quality of life. Many, many have family members physically disabled due to IEDs, bullets or other events of the war, let alone the psychological torment of their situation. Living in a rustic refugee camp or even refugee housing is a far cry from the comforts of the homes they left behind, the challenges are compounded by not being able to work and care for one's own family, and many struggle with despair.

In Jordan, there are an estimated 1.4 million refugees, making up more than 13 percent of the Jordanian population. Additionally, millions of Syrians are internally displaced from their homes and cities, not fortunate enough to have journeyed beyond the borders of Syria. Many are in desperate living situations with very limited resources, where it is difficult to get aid from other countries.

In July, the Sheep and Goats Collection will be designated to help Refugees and Displaced people in the Middle East. I ask you to prayerfully consider what you can do. Also consider what you can do that is not monetary. Can you write the White House, or Congressional Representatives on behalf of the refugees? What about praying unceasingly?

What would Jesus have you do for these neighbors across the ocean?

The construction crew continues to rehab the old houses in Cleveland to help rebuild neighborhoods and give a "hand up" to low income families (they need to work 250 hours for Habitat before being approved, and will have manageable mortgages). One of the current rehabs will be for girls who have been in Foster care and have reached the age of 18 and need to start working and supporting themselves. They will have an adult supervisor.

To help Greater Cleveland Habitat For Humanity to help others, they sponsor an annual WALK, (this year is the 16th).

MAY 13, Edgewater Park, Cleveland, along the Shoreway  
5K WALK,RUN, OR MOSEY will start at 10:00AM.
