# PASTOR'S CORNER

Dear Friends,

Recently, our men's group began studying a book called 'Seeing Grey in a Black and White World', by Methodist pastor Adam Hamilton. Sometimes people think of seeing grey as being wishy-washy and not taking a stand on important issues. Certainly, there are times when we are faced with either or answers, but very often wisdom results when we sit down and reason together and find that the answer is both/and. Our political landscape has sadly lost this ability to sit and listen and reason. It seems as if we put the worst construction on what those with whom we disagree think or say, while, at the same time, expecting them to put the best construction on our thoughts and words. As Christians, I believe we have a responsibility to offer a different way. In his book, Hamilton offers 4 ways to avoid speaking ill of others:

1. Remember Jesus' command to avoid making judgments that are not ours to make and avoid name calling.
2. To seek to understand our motivation to speak ill of someone. Often it comes from fear, jealousy, insecurity, or revenge.
3. Look for the good in the other rather than only seeing the negative.
4. Remember that I do not see the person the way God does. I may not know all the facts and certainly don't know the person's heart or past.

A house divided against itself cannot stand. I pray that we might seek to be people of peace and reconciliation in an angry and fragmented world.

**Income and Expenses Summary Notes:**

**Income**

The period ending March 31, 2017 has an operating deficit of \$1,317, which resulted in a positive variance of \$500 compared to March 2016. Congregational Contributions through March 2016 are approximately \$16K less than the total contributions received through March 2016; Building Use/Other Income is \$1K less than the amount this time last year. Total Income at March 31, 2017 is \$19K less than March 2016. Congregational Contributions are under budget by \$34K and Total Income is under budget by \$37K as of March 31, 2017. **Note:** *Other Income* includes periodic gifts made by Meals on Wheels and the St. Paul Preschool; the Thrivent Choice Donation program; paper recycling proceeds; and other miscellaneous unrestricted income. **Note:** the Meals on Wheels program at St. Paul ended December 31, 2016.

**Expenses**

Total expenses were under budget by \$30K as of March 31, 2017; and the total amount is \$20K less than total expenses as of March 31, 2016.

**Note:** Benevolence payments are percentages of contributions. Therefore, when contributions are higher, benevolence payments are higher.

## Council Corner.

As we are in the midst of spring, council has been undergoing some 'spring cleaning' of Church documents. This past Saturday, the council held a 'retreat'. The 3 hours were spent in review of our Church constitution. The current constitution is outdated, per today's guidelines. The current constitution was adopted in 2001 per the ELCA guidelines. Since that time there have been several revisions and updates. Dean Firing has graciously volunteered to review the constitution and provide updates as are required by the new constitution guidelines. There are several updates and changes that are going to be presented to the congregation later this year, with hopes we can vote on an updated constitution at our annual meeting in November.

We will be having future 'retreats' to address the By Laws of our constitution, and continuing resolutions as required. We will also be reviewing current job descriptions for our staff and make some adjustments as most of the job descriptions in place have been tweaked over the years.

I wish to thank all of church council for their attentiveness to detail, and their forward vision for St Paul's for the years to come. With a change in Senior Pastor on the horizon, we wish to get all documents up to current standards and provide our new Senior Pastor with detailed documents at their disposal.

## Property Committee News



Now that the Sanctuary renovation is completed, except for the repair of the stained glass which will be done this summer, the Property Committee has now returned to more of an evaluating and planning mode. Since the funding for the Sanctuary Renovation required twice the usual amount of money spent on capital replacements and upgrades, it will be 2019 before we will be able to continue with any sizeable replacement or upgrade projects. During the remainder of 2017 and year 2018, we hope to be able to do some less expensive cosmetic repairs to the building using the normal property maintenance budget. Items such as painting the water stained ceiling tiles and the frames of the remaining wood windows and entrance doors are targeted. Painting the remaining exterior wood will prolong their life and insure that they last a few extra years so that if a major need arises, the congregation won't be burdened with more than one higher cost project at a time.

Right now St. Paul's is in need of a few folks who like to pull weeds and trim shrubbery. The Key Bank employees will be at St. Paul's on May 24<sup>th</sup> to help spread mulch on the exterior flower beds, but the beds need to be prepared before the mulch can be spread. 

## REFUGEES: WHAT WOULD JESUS DO? - Sixth in a Series

Well, things have changed, haven't they? Perhaps not really for the better for the people of the Middle East. Escalation of conflict will not make things easier for them, at least for the immediate future. And now they are very limited in the ability to leave, since so many borders have been tightened up or closed.

But, I want to tell you about a young woman who was working with us last year. She is a medical doctor who had lived in a primarily Christian town of Qaraqosh, Iraq. She went to medical school in Mosul. When ISIS came to her city on August 6, 2014, she and her family were forced to leave and moved to Kurdistan for 3

months, then moved to Jordan after getting a visa. Note she precisely remembers the date, just as we remember Dec 7<sup>th</sup> or Sept 11<sup>th</sup>, she knows exactly when her world was turned upside down.

As with all refugees, she is unable to work in Jordan because she's a refugee, in spite of her medical education. She lives in an apt in Jordan, provided by the Jordanian government, with her mother and sister. They rely on assistance from the Jordanian government and other aid organizations.

During our wheelchair distribution she assisted us as a translator since she speaks 3 languages, Syrian, Arabic and English. She was quite helpful and eager to assist.

Living on charity from organizations and a foreign government is hard, especially since she is a trained professional with an ability to be employed and serve a community. She notes, **"This is not life" [living as a refugee]**.

I suspect those remaining in Syria or Iraq would agree that their life is not much better, with triple digit inflation, limited job opportunities, and very limited resources. The conflict has limited transportation of goods within their country and many people have fled the primary conflict areas, inundating smaller towns with more people than can be supported with local resources.

In July, the Sheep and Goats collection will be designated to help Refugees and Displaced people in the Middle East, we will have a guest with us on Sunday, July 9<sup>th</sup> from Global Hope International. Meanwhile, I ask you to prayerfully consider what you can do. Also consider what you can do that is not monetary. Can you write the White House, or Congressional Representatives? What about praying unceasingly?

What would Jesus have you do for these neighbors across the ocean?
